The Lectern

The lectern is the stand from which the holy scriptures are read. These include lessons from the Hebrew scriptures (such as histories, psalms, prophetic writings, and wisdom literature) and the epistles (letters) from the New Testament. It is a visible expression of the significance of holy scripture to the life of the church. The Gospel lessons are read from the center aisle, in the midst of the congregation with special reverence, as these contain the life and teachings of Jesus. And just as Jesus, lived and dwelt amongst humanity, we place his words at the center of the congregation's life.

A Reading from the Book of Acts

Acts 1:6-14

When the apostles had come together, they asked Jesus, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."



This unique piece of furniture is both an altar, upon which we present gifts of bread, wine, donations, praise, and thanksgivings to God as a sacrificial offerings; and, it a table around which we gather to celebrate God's love for us, by drawing us together as the body of Christ when we receive the sacrament of Holy Communion. As we receive Holy Communion, we seek reconciliation with God and one another; and are thereby emboldened to take God's love into the world.

Therefore we praise you, joining our voices with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:



The Communion Vessels

The vessels used are a chalice for wine, a paten for bread (or “host”), and a flagon for additional wine. They are placed on a square white linen cloth called a “corporal” (Latin word for “body”). The Eucharist (from the Greek meaning thanksgiving), is a sacrament at the center of Episcopal worship. A sacrament is an outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace. Once we receive communion, we ourselves, then become the vessels that take the outward and visible sign of God’s love and grace into the world.

After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, “Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me.”

Presider: And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Savior of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant.

Unite us in the sacrifice of Jesus Christ, through whom we are acceptable to you, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with [_____and] all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your children; through Jesus Christ our Savior, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

You may then either consume it, dip it lightly into the chalice, or take a sip of wine from the chalice.

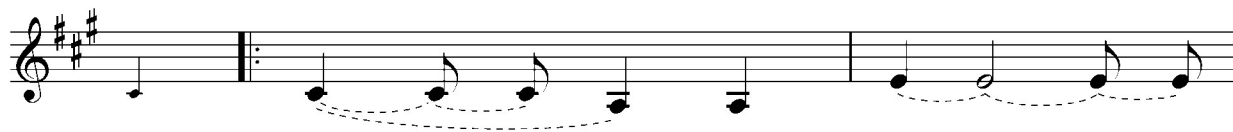
If you prefer a blessing only - cross your arms across your chest.
