
St. Francis of Assisi



Fall 2020 – Childrens' Worship – St. Mark's



Francis created what we call our Christmas Pageant – telling the story of Jesus being born to a poor family so poor people would realize how much Jesus was like them.






Francis made many friends and had lots of people to help him teach about God's love.
