Epiphany: God Appearing

All of Advent and the Christmas season celebrate God's appearing in our world in Jesus. The final liturgies of Christmas even have the official title "Epiphany" meaning "appearance." In our Western Christianity the Epiphany Gospel remembers the journey of the magi from the East to worship the Child Jesus. Matthew's gospel often explains how in Jesus God has kept his promises to the Jewish people. But Matthew also includes the story of the magi, non-Jews, to make it clear that Jesus represents God's love "appearing" for all people, Jew and Gentile alike. The new Church would soon call itself "catholic" which means "universal" as well as Christian. All nationalities, races, and cultures are called to faith in Christ.

In the Eastern Churches, Christians hear the story of the baptism of Christ on the Epiphany. Thus the climax of the Christmas story is not just a baby, but the full grown adult Jesus who is revealed at the Jordan River as the Son, beloved of the Father and filled with the Holy Spirit. In this story God "appears" in the Jesus who prepares to begin his ministry that will culminate in his death and resurrection.

In our Episcopal and much of the Western tradition we celebrate both the Epiphany to the Magi and the Epiphany at the Baptism on two different days. Sometimes these days are consecutive Sundays, but this year these days are January 6 and 8. As we live as the Church, the body of Christ, in this world, the epiphany of God continues in and through us. In our lives joined to Christ and each other, we represent the epiphany of Christ who continues to call all people to faith in him. Our lives of ministry reveal the Christ who continues to reach out to help and save people in many different circumstances. The Incarnation and the Epiphany did not end two thousand years ago. God continues his becoming flesh in our lives; Christ continues his appearing through us. The mystery of Christmas includes the ongoing reality of our lives joined to Christ and making him present in our world. This is Epiphany in our lives. (continued next page)

Operations Update as of November 2016

November Budgeted Pledge Income: \$188,362 Actual \$205,350 Pledge

For the first time in many years our operations budget has been managed such that we have not had to go into the principal of our investment account. As of November 30, 2016 we have an operational deficit of \$18,471—a remarkable feat as our approved budget had a \$66,000 deficit. This amount will be funded through gifts received through December 2016 and the difference covered from the investment account.

Average Sunday Attendance: YTD - 112.9

2017 Pledge Campaign update: 90 pledge units, total \$271,481! Well on way to a goal of 100 pledges. Your generous pledging reduces our reliance on the investment account to fund operations, allowing the principal to grow and earn more interest to fund capital projects and improvements.

- be active in and knowledgeable about the congregation, its programs and governance;

- have enthusiasm and vitality for this ministry;
- commit time to vestry meetings, committee work; vestry retreat, regular worship; congregational events, annual meeting;

You truly won't want to miss her monologue performance! As a follow-up to this performance, we will then meet later in the month after church to discuss ways of serving those in prison.



Beginning late in 2016 and continuing into 2017, St. Mark's Evangelism Team is discerning its mission in the church and in the community. Evangelism for us is invitation, intentional and spirit-led invitation into ministry that connects us as individuals and as community to Jesus and leads us to God.


RVA Talks @ St. Mark's

What One Community of Faith Can Do To Produce Racial Healing and Reconciliation

February 19, 2017, 4pm:

RVA Talks @ St. Mark's: The Prison Industrial Complex

For the spring 17 installment of RVA Talks @ St. Mark's, we will host a discussion about the experience of people within the prison industrial complex. Dr. David Coogan, a faculty member of the VCU Department of English and co-author of the memoir Writing Our Way Out (as well as member of St. Paul's), will lead a panel discussion about the American prison experience with former inmates of the Richmond City Jail. Dr. Coogan teaches a class at the jail in which inmates write about their lives before incarceration, their experience of incarceration, and their plans for



their post-incarceration lives. Each panelist, including Dr. Coogan, will read excerpts from Writing Our Way Out before opening up for questions. Information on how to get involved with Dr. Coogan's work at the city jail will also be shared. Join us for this thought-provoking event that will shed light on an often-forgotten population of our city.

"This is a work of creative non-fiction. It's my memoir of teaching a writing class to prisoners. And it's ten prisoners' memoirs, written with this hope in mind: that each man might understand the story of his life, and in so doing, change its course." - David Coogan, excerpt from the introduction


The discussion will conclude with an opportunity for the authors to address questions submitted by the audience.

Between the World and Me by Te-Nehisi Coates

In a profound work that pivots from the biggest questions about American history and ideals to the most intimate concerns of a father for his son, Ta-Nehisi Coates offers a powerful new framework for understanding our nation's history and current crisis. Americans have built an empire on the idea of "race," a falsehood that damages us all but falls most heavily on the bodies of black women and men—bodies exploited through slavery and segregation, and, today, threatened, locked up, and murdered out of all proportion. What is it like to inhabit a black body and find a way to live within it? And how can we all honestly reckon with this fraught history and free ourselves from its burden?

RVA Rapid Transit January 15 @ noon

Come and hear about progress in bringing transportation equity to the Richmond metropolitan region. We have a group of parish members and friends who are involved in lobbying Chesterfield County and other

localities to open their roads to rapid transit bus lines. It is a critical need for the growth and health of our metropolitan area.

Currently Metropolitan Richmond is the only city of 1 million or more people in the world that does not have full-service public transportation along its major arteries.



Today, 90% of our jobs are inaccessible by public transportation. All of our major community colleges—which were promoted in the General Assembly as places to enable people to train for their first job—are inaccessible by public transportation. Our three major universities can only be reached on the bus by people in the central city. Neither our airport nor our train service is accessible by public transportation. As everyone knows, the new "town centers" and retail malls are not accessible except by private automobile.

GraceInside March 5 @ noon



GraceInside is a privately funded organization that provides chaplains for Virginia's state prison system. Currently over 30,000 men and women are incarcerated in our state prisons—the equivalent of Virginia Tech's student body—chaplains provide emotional and spiritual support for these men and women during what is one of the most difficult passages of their lives. GraceInside changes lives. Through relationships GraceInside's chaplains share light in a dark place, safe passage through the storm and guidance for the journey home.

Pilgrim: A Course for the Christian Journey

Pilgrim retains an unapologetic focus on Christian fundamentals and fellowship, while acknowledging a need for individualization and cultural sensitivity among contemporary inquirers.



Building a Solid Foundation for Christian Life

There seems to be a fresh movement in the Episcopal Church and other mainline churches, one the Rt. Rev. Michael Curry calls "The Jesus Movement." In congregations across the country we are talking more about joining God's mission and following the Way of Jesus. What do we really believe? Why does it matter? How do we follow Jesus when we are not in church? The need and desire for basic instruction in the Christian faith is palpable.

<u>Pilgrim</u>, from Church Publishing, is an attractive, accessible, and affordable resource for adults to build a solid foundation for contemporary Christian life. The aim of Pilgrim is clear: to help people become disciples of Jesus Christ. The small group format blends Christian practices of hospitality, prayer, study, and reflection to provide a rich learning environment that welcomes questions and introduces foundational texts and themes of Christianity.

Pilgrim draws from strengths of earlier discipleship programs such as Alpha, Disciples of Christ in Community, and even Cursillo, by retaining an unapologetic focus on Christian fundamentals and fellowship, while acknowledging a need for individualization and cultural sensitivity among contemporary inquirers.

Stages of Discipleship

Pilgrim has two stages, Follow and Grow. Each responds to the same four core questions: What do Christians believe? How do Christians know and worship God? How do Christians live? What is the Christian vision for the world?

Follow, for inquirers and those who are new to the faith, is structured around four central texts: The Baptismal Covenant, the Lord's Prayer, the Commandments, and the Beatitudes.

Grow provides a deeper response by inviting participants to engage major themes of Christian life: the Creeds, the Eucharist, the Bible, and the Church in the World.

As Presiding Bishop Michael Curry describes in the forward, "Jesus did not establish an institution, found a religion, or create an organization. Jesus began a movement!" Pilgrim offers training — one 6-week course at a time — to prepare individuals for a lifelong commitment to the Jesus Movement.
