Our Intentional God

Jesus Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Before we get too far from Holy Week I want to once again thank the many people who were so generous with their time and talent which made our celebrations happen. I suspect that most folks only see the tip of the liturgical iceberg, so to say. The Floral Guild and the Altar Guild members made the church a place of beauty. The Ushers and Greeters shepherded the faithful with hospitality and welcome. Our wonderful Choir rallied around the celebrations and blessed us with music that made our prayer



resound. The Worship Ministers moved with ease and made the services special. Of special note is the Holy Week readers of the Passion narratives on Palm Sunday and Good Friday. And I cannot offer enough thanks to our dedicated and gifted staff who are always called to double and triple duty in addition to their day to day responsibilities in the weeks of preparation for this sacred week. They always rise to the occasion.

The life, death, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus exemplify for the world just how intensely and intentionally loving God is. Not only did he send his Son into the world, but after the world rejected him, killed him, and evicted him from the planet, the Father sent him right back in his resurrection. St. Paul reminds us how important the resurrection remains for our lives as followers of Jesus. He says in 1 Corinthians 15:17, "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is in vain."

And even more pointedly, God sent Jesus back to the same apostles who had abandoned him, betrayed him and denied him. A greater miracle than coming back to life is going back to those disciples who

were losers, betrayers, cowards, and deniers! Jesus might have discarded them and started off with a new and better kind of apostle. But he went back to the original disciples, as flawed as they were, to clearly proclaim that nothing they could do would make Jesus not love them. The same applies to us: nothing we can do will make God love us less and nothing we can do will make God love us more.

Not only did he come back to them, he reinstated them and commissioned them to spread the good news: "As the Father sent me, I send you" (John 20:21). He relied on those flawed apostles, as he relies on us. It is through our risen Lord that God communicates new life and transforms us. We do not just live by his teachings or follow his example. We live in his presence through which he communicates the power of the Holy Spirit to us and we become the body of Christ in the world.

Easter represents the gospel – the good news – that what God did for Jesus he wants to do for us. Easter revealed the identity of God as one whose love never lets us go, as one who loves humanity not just in this world but even through death and beyond. God did not and does not give up on loving our world.

Jesus Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!




The Episcopal Church:




You Can't Touch My Hair: And Other Things I Still Have to Explain by Phoebe Robinson






We too visit the Garden of Gethsemane at the foot of the Mount of Olives in Jerusalem, the Upper Room, Calvary's Hill and the Empty Tomb. There we find ourselves with the same human doubts and fears that those early disciples and apostles experienced and the same yearnings for divine guidance, grace, joy, and assurance found in Christ's teachings, example, and in the Easter Life of Christ's Resurrection. When we say, Love is our Tradition, it is grounded in God's gift of love and salvation given through Christ Jesus to all that we may have eternal life.

During confirmation many years ago, much time was spent learning about the sacraments, especially Baptism and the Observance of the Eucharist. Faith to Fate Advance Care Planning

There is an old adage that only two things in life can be counted on: death & taxes. Ironically the two kind of go together... In my life, having just gone through the decline and death of my mother I will share with you that the one thing that made a difficult time less painful was knowing all the decisions had been made. In my mother's case there was agreement that there would be no tubes, no ventilators, no extraordinary measures to prolong living when life was really gone. And this was supported by written documents. It also helped tremendously that all the final arrangements were



made with her when she could still make choices. And it was a blessing that her financial house was in order, too—no mysteries as to where the bank accounts were or what investments she held. As the end of Mom's life neared we could focus on making sure she was not in pain (palliative care), and prepare ourselves to say goodbye.

This didn't happen on its own. There is no magic that makes sure death happens without family emergency room arguments, unnecessary pain for a loved one, and those we leave behind are not left bewildered and beset by planning when they've no clue what to do. It takes intentional effort and careful consideration on the part of the person with their family, and it takes legal and financial expertise. It takes planning.

The church can play a role in helping families have these conversations and make these plans. Faith to Fate is a program designed work within churches to both educate on end of life issues and help people prepare the documents necessary to protect themselves and loved ones. Its three-part program provides needed information on end of life - what "doing everything" really means and how advance care plans and medical advocates can help avoid unnecessary pain and suffering. Faith to Fate also provides education about wills and power of attorney—legal protections for you and your loved ones. Education results in action as by the third session professionals are on hand to help draft and notarize a will, POA, and advance care documents for participants.

The church has a role to play and we will be sharing more information on *Faith to Fate* and other faith-based programs to help individuals and families make decisions around end of life and estate issues.
