God is With Us


Some celebrations of the Christmas season go way back to the early Church in the fourth century. By the end of the fourth century when Christianity not only became legal, but also when it became the official religion of the Roman Empire the whole Church, East and West, celebrated God's coming into the world in Christ, Christmas, and Epiphany, the appearing or revelation of Christ to the Gentiles, the non-Jews - for all people.

So much of the Christmas story sounds so Jewish: a Jewish baby is born to Jewish woman in a Jewish family in a Jewish city in fulfillment of Jewish prophecies. He receives a Jewish name on the day of his Jewish circumcision and is raised by an observant Jewish family. They go to synagogue in Nazareth and the Temple in Jerusalem. In the story of the Magi, the pagan Magi seek to worship him. Jesus came to become Savior not just of the Jews but of all people. Epiphany celebrates that God loves all people. He wants everyone to know his love— no exclusions because of race, national or ethnic origin, sexual orientation, rich or poor, young or old. Don't we need to hear that message in a world so divided along ethnic and religious and many other boundaries?

Epiphany celebrates that no one is excluded from the love of God in Christ. God appears for

all people. God appears in our humanity. The feast of the Epiphany emerged in the fourth century in the Eastern Church, probably in Egypt which was a center of Christian development. The Eastern Church used the gospel of the Baptism of the Lord for the Epiphany. In that gospel, God appears at the event at the Jordan: the voice of the Father proclaims Jesus as his beloved Son, who has the Spirit descending upon him as a dove. This gospel shows us the Incarnation, the Word made flesh, God become human. We meet God in the human Christ and in the humanness of our lives. Our God is here - among us, within us, through us and in us. Jesus shared with us everything human, from birth to death, from the manger to the cross, and we still meet him in the same humanity. In joy and sorrow, in failure and success, in stress and in peace, in life and in death, God is there for us. God appears in our humanity to transform our lives.

That miracle represents all the miracles of Christ in which "God appears" to transform water becomes wine, the cripples become whole, the dead rise. The miracle of Cana becomes a challenge for the Church today. We become the way Jesus transforms lives and reveals himself. We are the "appearing" of God in the world in our lives, in our goodness, in our words and deeds. May 2019 be a blessed year of being transformed by the love of God into his people of peace and accepting our call as Jesus's followers to share the Gospel through our lives.

Operations Update as of November 2018

November Budgeted Income: \$375,600 Actual (pledges \$222,556) \$330,570 Budgeted (budgeted pledges \$243,500)

Our operations budget continues to be managed such that we have not had to go into the principal of our investment account.

Average Sunday Attendance: 2018 - 117.19

2019 Pledge Campaign update: 92 pledge units, total \$289,857! Well on way to a goal of 98 pledges. We are happy to report that a significant number of parishioners have raised their pledges, and we have new pledges.

Our monetary goal-to be achieved over a period of years-is to end the annual draw on the investment account to balance the budget. To leap forward and achieve this goal in the present campaign would require \$335,000 in pledged income.

SHARED MINISTRY: BUILDING REPAIRS 2019

Caring for This Beautiful Place

Some people have expressed concern about peeling plaster and paint. While the structure has been well maintained over its almost one hundred years on the boulevard as a sign and symbol of God's presence among us, there is a need to address necessary repairs in order for the building to be here for generations to come – as it is for us.

A plan is in place to address these issues. In order to address the interior repairs we must first address the exterior of the building. We have replaced the protective coverings on the front left and right windows and on the large windows of the nave and narthex. Much of the replacement cost for the large windows was covered by our insurance because of storm(s) damage.

The next phase of the work is also underway. We have received insight and estimates from roofing specialists who understand the construction of historic buildings. We know that there are problems with the sheeting under the slate. After 95 years some of it has deteriorated. Options are being explored for this major repair. The outside brick walls will need to be sealed since water is able to seep through the porous bricks and cause interior problems. Additionally, the gutters need to be replaced. We have agreed with the advice of our Property Team co-chair, Brent Graves, to maintain the services of an experienced project manager to oversee this work.

The interior work is needed because it has been a number of years since the painting and plaster repair was done on the interior. And because of the roof issues, water seepage under the slate on the roof and between the slats that hold the slate in place is occurring and causing problems with the plaster. With the roof fixed and the walls sealed we will be able to move forward with the interior work of plastering and painting without concern that these issues will recur. We will also address lighting and sound issues in this process. Our Property Team and Interiors Team have selected a consulting company whose services will be contracted for guidance on the lighting and sound issues.

The Property Team, Finance Team, Vestry, and Rector know the importance of this project. We have explored options for financing this work and have decided that we will borrow the money from the Diocesan Missionary Society, DMS, which is the diocesan bank. Commercial banks were also explored as a source of funding but the interest rate with DMS was lower. We are also working to increase the income from our parking lot which will be a means of helping to repay the loan. More about this later. As I also said to you in mid- December one of the areas the DMS looks at in considering our loan is our trends in pledge income. If you haven't already pledged for 2019 please do so. We will be completing the paperwork soon. If you believe in our mission at St. Mark's please show your support in a pledge whether it is small or large. We are grateful to all who support St. Mark's in this and so many ways.

Not only is the building a place of solace and still, a place of gathering to worship, but also a place out of which so much ministry is joyfully done in the name of Jesus. Thanks be to God for those before us as well as us who have so carefully maintained this beautiful place of ministry. Please be patient as we work out details with contractors who have fallen behind in many of their jobs already scheduled due to the wet conditions of 2018. You will be kept apprised as we move ahead in the next few months.

Sincere thanks for your love and continued support of St. Mark's.

Organ Repairs!

Recently the organ underwent some relatively minor repairs. We had to fix some leaking leather pouches. A bit of background:

In the 17th and 18th Centuries organs were constructed so that the pipes sat in racks on wind chests and these pipes "spoke" directly into the room. In the 19th Century French builders began enclosing the largest secondary division (the Swell division) of the organ in a large wooden chamber whose front "wall" was a comprised of a series of vertical wooden slats, each one 8 to 10 inches wide, which, when open allowed the sound of the pipes to travel into the room relatively unimpeded. When closed, these slats formed a solid "wall" and thereby muffled somewhat the sound of the pipes. The shades could be opened or closed by the organist by means of a pedal or "shoe" at the console. This feature is still used today by organ builders, and allows for gradual and controlled "crescendos" and "decrescendos" in the sound. It also allows for the sounds in the enclosed division to be balanced with sounds in the other divisions.

In our instrument there are two enclosed divisions, and each of the shades in each division was controlled by a leather pouch which opened or closed the shade. Over the years these

pouches had dried out, cracked, and begun to leak, markedly reducing the response of the shade to any change in the position of the pedal at the console. The malfunctioning pouches were replaced by a single rod (one for each division) which operates all the shades in series on that particular box by one computerized motor. After some initial difficulties with getting the computers and motors sufficiently and effectively grounded, the mechanisms are operating perfectly.

If you are curious about this aspect of the organ, stop by the console any Sunday morning for a brief demonstration.
